






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## **Choice Based Lettings Online Portal Now Live**



#### 186,957 Calls in 2021

During 2021, our Customer Care Agents dealt with a total of 186,957 phone calls from the public and have a 85-90% resolution rate as the first point of contact for our customers. This means that the Agents can deal with queries without the need to transfer calls onwards, thereby providing a very high quality service to the public

For the period 1st – 24th December 2021, our Customer Care Agents dealt with a total of 11,620 calls and 1,451 emails

## **Community Activities Fund Details**

Details of the new Community Activities Fund under the Community Enhancement Programme will be launched in early January 2022.

Fingal LCDC has been allocated €301,042 to distribute to qualifying community and voluntary groups. The Community Activities Fund will support groups, particularly in disadvantaged areas with running costs and small capital items and facilities improvements.

This funding is about giving a helping hand to communities, local groups and clubs. This new fund is being administered by the Fingal LCDC and will be

open for applications in January and into February 2022.

## Fun with Families from **Afar - Migrant Family Literacy Project Pilot**

This project aimed to deliver high quality family literacy sessions to an identified group. A collaborative approach was taken between Fingal Libraries, Fingal Community Department and Integration Office and members of the DCU Write to Read research team including Stephen Brett and Ann Marie Roche. The Write to Read project is a longitudinal research project which aims to work with schools to create powerful literacy environments.

In tandem with the Community Department in Fingal, the Flemington area of Balbriggan was chosen as the location for the initial pilot project. Flemington is designated a high priority area under the actions identified in the Fingal Migrant Integration and Social Cohesion Strategy and scores highly on the deprivation scale.

Five families were chosen to take part in the pilot and this was based on the expertise of teachers in the local the Educate Together National School. The low numbers of participants were dictated by COVID-19.

Lessons on vocabulary, reading to your child and phonics took place over 5 weeks in the Aster Family Centre and at Balbriggan Library. All participants were given a tour and membership of Fingal Libraries. The participating children and their siblings were entertained each week with a variety of events including wellness, art and storytelling.

Each child received a book bag containing 6 books: What We'll Build, Hugless Dougless, Owl Babies, Aliens Love Underpants, A Squash and a Squeeze and Wishing on a Shell.

The project has now concluded the pilot. There is a substantial waiting list of families who wish to participate and the course will be run again in 2022

## **Urbact Playful Towns Event**

The Rush Urbact Local Group (ULG) continued the Let's Play Rush initiative which aims to increase the playfulness of the residents of the town running a series of events on the 18th December 2021.

With funding from the Local Live Performance Programming Scheme from the Department of Tourism, Rush ULG with the assistance of Local Councillors, Rush Community Council and Rush Tidy Towns organised the following events on the 18th December as part of the Let's Play Rush Initiative:





## **Car Parking Services in Fingal**




There was a total of 1,267 parking tickets issued during November 2021. The graphics above show the breakdown of parking offences and the locations where tickets were issued across Fingal.

## **Road Opening Licence Info**

The Licensing unit continues to process and manage the licensing system for the County, applications are allocated by area for examination and conditioning which includes reviews of the existing carriageway, footpaths, cycleways, and grass verges. Applicants submit temporary traffic management plans for review to ensure all works are carried out safely within the public domain.

Road Opening licences are a cross functional process for the department and is essential for the asset management of Fingal County Council Road network. 138 licences were granted in December 2021 as of 20/12/2021.



## **Water Services Works Summary**

Water production and distribution, wastewater collection, treatment & disposal continue to be provided as agreed in the Service Level Agreement with Irish Water. The Council continue to have responsibility for the Storm Water Network.

#### Storm Water (surface water) Network - Operations

Operation and maintenance of the stormwater network is ongoing, in line with Covid-19 restrictions.

#### Works summary:

- · Phase 1 (Advance works) to install a section of new stormwater (surface water) network in Ballyboughal is completed, in conjunction with FCC's Housing Department. Phase 2 will comprise of the installation of 35m of 450mm diameter pipe. These works are currently on hold pending the agreement of wayleaves. Agreement has been reached with one landowner negotiations are ongoing with the adjoining landowner.
- $\cdot$  The Storm water manhole cover and frame replacement programme for replacing assets at the end of life is ongoing Covers and frames were replaced at various locations in Ballyboughal, Swords, and Lusk areas.
- · Works to Jet, drag and to carry out a CCTV survey along the Old Bawn and The Bawn in Malahide on the Storm water networks have been completed. A tender is being completed for a detailed design for an upgrade to the Storm water network within and around The Bawn and the Old Bawn. It is hoped that construction works on this new network will take place in 2022. When all these factors taken in to account the view is that the likelihood of flooding events in the future will be greatly reduced.
- · CCTV surveys are complete in the St Benedict's estate in Malahide and La Verna in Baldoyle to ascertain the location of misconnections to the Stormwater network from the foul system.

- · Other maintenance and minor works programmes are ongoing. Works to CCTV, drag and clean the Storm Water network in Inbhir Ide, Texas Lane and Yellow Walls road in Malahide are nearing completion. FCC are awaiting the removal of a gas service by Gas Networks once removed this programme will be complete. Works were carried out to clean a Stormwater ditch that Inbhir Ide drains to, to help alleviate and future flooding events.
- · Works are ongoing at No: 18 Dublin Rd, Bayside to fit a Tideflex flap on an overflow culvert to resolve a rodent issue and stop material being washed up the from the coast. Patch work is complete, and a screen is to be installed before the end of December. This area is Tidal leading to longer than expected duration for completion.
- · Quotes have been received from contractors to jet, drag and CCTV survey the Stormwater network in Chalfont, Malahide to assist road operations with the alleviation of ongoing road flooding. A tender will be posted for responses with works commencing in early January 2022.

#### Irish Water - Towards a National Publicly-Owned, Regulated, Water Services Utility

The Government's Policy Paper on Water Sector Transformation, entitled Irish Water – Towards a National, Publicly-Owned, Regulated, Water Services Utility was published on Tuesday 23rd February 2021.

The paper sets out the Government's approach to water sector transformation including addressing Irish Water as the Single Public Utility. The Council will continue to work to implement Government policy in regard to water.

Work continues on the Sustainable Swords project. The ambition of Sustainable Swords is to create a multi-faceted approach to the planning, design and management of the town, in order to achieve better quality places as the physical setting for life in Swords. Sustainable Swords plans to consolidate and strengthen the historic town centre of Swords. The project will also set specific objectives for the town centre with the goal of increasing the resilience of the local economy and fostering an enhanced, accessible,

inclusive, child friendly and healthy urban environment. A second stage of consultation took place in October 2021. This follows the 'Your Swords, Your Say' survey which was carried out in May and the briefing session with Elected Members in July.

The submissions and comments received are being considered, with the draft Strategy expected to issue early next year.

## Church fields Link Road and Cycle Network Update

A Letter of Acceptance has issued to Fox Building and Engineering Ltd. to enter into contract for the main works for this project, with site operations programmed to commence in early 2022.

This work will underpin the ongoing development of the Church Fields residential and parkland development and provide significantly improved accessibility to the adjacent school's campus from the wider area. The works are being funded by the National Transport Authority and the Dept of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and will be managed by project engineers from the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Department.

# Fingal Vacant Site Register

There are currently 11 sites on the Vacant Site Register (VSR).

These include 3 residential sites and 8 regeneration sites.

# **Update on Snugborough Interchange Upgrade**

Major bridge construction works were undertaken in December where an arched underpass was installed over the course of two days. Piling works for bridge abutments has been completed this month and retaining walls on adjacent roads are currently being built. Piling works for the central pier will be concluded in January with significant traffic management to be put in place on the N3 from January onwards to facilitate these works.

## Taking in Charge Details

- Rahillion Phase 1 in Donabate and Hampton Green in Balbriggan were Taken in Charge in December 2021. Weavers Wood Clonsilla, foul sewer & watermains in St. Marys, Baldoyle, and a hammerhead extension at Old Golf Links, Malahide are due to be Taken in Charge in January 2022.
- We have 46 Developments with formal TIC requests and a further 306 developments on our system, of which 62 are likely to remain private.
- Phase 1 TIC works on the following estates -Chieftain's Way, Martello, New Haven Bay are currently underway.
- Phase 2 TIC works Drynam are under construction now. There are also works almost complete in Thornleigh Swords by a completion contractor on behalf of the bondsman.

- The contract documents for engagement of Consulting Engineers to manage the Ongar remediation works necessary to bring the estates in Ongar up to Taking in Charge standard were published on the 10th December 2021 on Etenders. ie with a closing date of the 7th January 2022.
- There are currently 33 developers set up on our External Taking in Charge Sharepoint Site to upload Taking in Charge documentation.
- A yearly review of the Taking in Charge Policy and Specifications is underway and meetings between Building Control and other Sections responsible for producing the Policy and Specifications have been carried out with the intention to release an update to the Policy and specifications in January 2022.







## Public Consultation on Churchfields, D15



The Council commenced the public consultation planning process on 9th December for proposed construction of 300 dwellings, 1 no. crèche facility, 1 no. communal facility, 2 no. retail units, Eastern Linear Park and all associated site development works on a 9.47 ha site at Church Fields, Mulhuddart, Dublin 15. Closing date for submissions is 31st January 2022. Plans are available for viewing online at http://consult.fingal.ie

## Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan now Replaced by LAHL

The Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan (RIHL) ceases to operate on the 4th January 2022. As a result of the reforms in Housing For All, the loan product will be replaced with the new Local Authority Home Loan (LAHL).

The loan continues the interest rate discounts applied to RIHL in September, but there are two significant differences in the new loan;

1. In urban local authorities, which includes Fingal, the single applicant income maximum is raised to 65,000 per annum.

2. The "fresh start" principle applies to applicants who are separated, divorced or have exited insolvency/bankruptcy, in regards to the definition of first time buyer status. These applicants must still prove no continued liability or interest in a previously owned property.

Completed RIHL applications received prior to 4th January will continue to be processed under RIHL regulations. Thereafter RIHL will be discontinued, and applicants can apply for the new loan. The current position in relation to the RIHL is as follows:





## Government Road Safety Strategy - First Step towards 'Vision Zero'



Department of Transport, Hildegarde Naughton officially launched Ireland's fifth Road Safety Strategy 2021 - 2030 on Tuesday 14th December and can be reviewed at https:// www.rsa.ie/about/safetystrategy-2021-2030

The primary aim of the government's new road safety strategy is to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries on Irish roads by 50% over the next 10 years. This means reducing deaths on Ireland's roads annually from 144 to 72 or lower and reducing serious injuries from 1,259 to 630 or lower by 2030.

The Road Safety Strategy 2021-2030 will be delivered in three phases. Phase 1 which runs from 2021 to 2024 is investment and includes 50 high-impact actions and 136 support actions.

The strategy is the first step in achieving the 2020 Programme for Government commitment of bringing Ireland to 'Vision Zero'. This is to eliminate all road deaths and serious injuries on Irish roads by the year 2050. The Road Safety Strategy 2021-2030 builds on the progress made during the last road safety strategy which saw Ireland achieve the lowest number of annual road deaths since records began and the second lowest rate of road deaths in the EU in

We will commence the preparation of Fingal's Road Safety Strategy early in the

## eCargo Bike Launch in Malahide

The Active Travel section launched our eCargo Bike Pilot Initiative on Thursday 2nd December in Malahide. Active Travel have purchased a total of 4 bikes as part of this pilot. Two bikes were delivered to The Village Garden Centre in Malahide and Altitude Coffee in Donabate.

These state of the art eCargo bikes are intended to replace the use of motor vehicles for local area deliveries. As part of its commitment to climate action and providing sustainable alternatives, Fingal County Council is providing the bikes free of charge to the businesses for 12 months under a Service Level Agreement.

The bikes have been branded for each business with their own logos. A further two bikes will be delivered to local businesses in the coming

This project extends the reach of Active Travel to the business community for the first time and we are delighted to be working with local businesses to encourage sustainable modes of transport.

The Active Travel section will monitor and review this pilot over the 12month period to determine its success to include reports on level of usage, frequency of deliveries, cost savings to the business and environmental benefits.





## **ELV Operation Yields 145 Vehicles**





A major End of Life Vehicle (ELV) operation was completed during December by Fingal County Council's Waste Enforcement Unit. A total of 80 end of life vehicles and 65 commercial trucks/trailers were removed from a site at Barn Lodge, Finglas, Dublin 11 and brought to authorised treatment facilities for recovery and disposal. The vehicles which were abandoned were being illegally dismantled causing environmental pollution. Burning of waste was also taking place on site. A total of 120 tonnes of waste was removed as part of the operation and brought to a licensed waste facility for disposal. Once cleared the site was secured using security fencing and earth berms to prevent re-entry. A combination of waste enforcement inspections, drone surveys and Garda patrols will be utilised to prevent further illegal activity at the site.

A multi-agency approach was used involving An Garda Siochana, Customs, Social Protection, the Roads Safety Authority, the Waste Enforcement Regional Leads Authority (WERLA), the National Transfrontier Shipment Office (NTFSO), Fingal Waste Enforcement officers and vehicle

Tackling unauthorised End of Life Vehicle (ELV) sites is a National Waste Enforcement Priority for 2021. Unauthorised storage and dismantling of ELV's poses a significant risk to the environment. ELV's contain a range of hazardous materials such as lead acid batteries, catalytic convertors and fluids including lubricating oil, coolant, brake fluid which can have a significant impact on the environment if not depolluted

and disposed of properly. Fingal's Waste Enforcement Unit continue to focus efforts on illegal ELV yards with 60 sites cleared and closed down within the past 2 years as part of an ongoing ELV Project.

For vehicles found illegally dumped a fixed payment notice is issued to the registered owner or upon summary conviction in the district court a fine of up to €5,000 can apply. It's the owner's legal responsibility to bring their scrap car to an authorised treatment facility (ATF) who can safely dispose of the vehicle and issue a certificate of destruction (CoD). ATF's are permitted facilities authorised to treat and recover end of life vehicles (scrap cars and vans). They have the necessary infrastructure for handing ELV's so that they're dismantled in an environmentally friendly manner with hazardous materials removed.

Owners of old cars can deposit these Free-of-Charge at an ATF with two located within Fingal:

There have been 1,444 planning applications received to the end of November 2021, 90 of these applications were invalid leaving a total of 1,354 valid applications. The volume of applications received by Local Electoral Area (LEA) is detailed in the table below.

Up to end of November 2021, 9 Strategic Housing Development (SHD) applications were made to An Bord Pleanála, plus 1 for amendments totalling 5,119 units. 10 decisions were made by the board up to end of November 2021. Of these, 7 were granted, 1 in February, 1 in March, 3 in September and 1 in November (3,325 units). 1 was one granted in July for amendments. 3 applications were Refused, 1 in March, 1 in June and 1 in July.

There is a total of 3 SHD's (1,655 units) currently in the formal application process.
